Comments: Considered one of the most popular houseplants available. Extremely tolerant of many conditions and difficult to kill. Mature plants that are properly cared for can have many generations of plantlets extending from the mother plant. Chlorophytum comosum has odd fleshy roots that surprise most when being transplanted. Flowers will sometimes appear along the stems.

Toxicity: Can cause upset stomach if large quantities are ingested.
